It has been a momentous year for our school community. We achieved another Ofsted "Good" rating in November, with inspectors praising our ambition for pupils as well as our broad enrichment offer, including opportunities to photograph the night sky through our astronomy club!

As we said farewell to 10 years of Compass School and started a new chapter as The Charter School Bermondsey, we are grateful for the contributions of former Chair of Governors, Martin Deutz and Chair of the Compass Schools' Trust, Doug Lewis. With us from the very beginning, they worked diligently on this transfer, confident that we would continue to flourish as the newest member of The Charter Schools' Educational Trust.

As the year drew to a close, we celebrated our pupils' achievements at prize-giving and in our final assembly. We know that behind every student's success, is a support network, cheering them on to be the best that they can be. This is a real team effort; pupils, parents and school working in genuine partnership.


Prize-Giving 2023 by Ms Walkey-Williams



We now live in a much more technologically advanced society and it is vital that we don't forget the importance of books and reading.


- Books have primarily been a freedom of expression for humans around the world.

Flying High by Huntley, Principal

Charter Bermondsey students took to the skies as part of the Honourable Company of Air Pilots' initiative to get young people flying. Charter Bermondsey students were joined by students from Charter East Dulwich for a memorable experience at Cambridge Glide Centre.

Students received a flight in a glider under the instruction of an experienced qualified instructor. Gliders are unpowered aircraft, so it's launched either by winch or via an aero-tow behind a powered aircraft. Using naturally occurring currents of rising air, gliders can remain airborne for hours and travel hundreds of kilometres.



Our students had flights of around 20 minutes in a two-seat aircraft, enjoying the extraordinary views of the Cambridge countryside. Some students even got the opportunity to take control under the supervision of their instructor.

Captain Pete, Honourable Company of Air Pilots said: "What a well-behaved and polite bunch of students!"

This term, Year 10 explored the world of work!


We started with a Dress to Impress day, where pupils came to school in their smartest clothes, and they continued to impress in their placements, drawing many commendations from their 'employers'.
