Dear student

Your future after Year 11

Over the coming months you will be making important choices about what you will do after year 11. We want to make sure you have either a college place, a job, or training to go to after school.

I know GCSE, A-level and BTEC exams returned in summer 2022 following the upheaval caused by the coronavirus pandemic. I want you to know that Southwark Council is working with colleges, employers and schools to provide you with as many opportunities as we can.

The council is mindful of the impact that the COVID-19 pandemic has had on all our young people. Our Youth New Deal is there to ensure that our education, employment, youth services and the new youth parliament work together to ensure young people get the support they need to succeed. Our post 16 offer is an important part of our new deal for young people.

We have developed a new digital information hub called **One Hub** where young people and families will be able to search up to date information about youth activities to do in their area. It will also be a one stop shop for helpful information and signposting on a wide range of youth related topics and with particular focus on job vacancies, career support, apprenticeships, volunteering opportunities, etc. The website has been developed with input from, and tested by, young people throughout. This platform has been designed especially with mobile phones in mind as this is the device most young people have access to.

Our young people's opportunities webpage empowers young people to achieve their participation age to stay in education or find employment with training, our website gives you information about up to the minute opportunities, **Employment, training, careers information, volunteering and business support for young people.**

In the meantime, this prospectus will help you through the process. It tells you all about the options available to you in Southwark while you are in-year 12 and 13.

Whether you want to go on to A Levels, do a technical or professional course, start an apprenticeship, or take up a traineeship, work and train. Whatever your future holds, there's something in Southwark for you. Do have a look at the great apprenticeship scheme the council runs. As an apprentice you can earn and learn at the same time. And every year we offer lots of different placements.

As a Southwark Council apprentice, you will work towards a nationally recognised qualification, and will get the London Living Wage. If you are interested, you can find out more at **Southwark apprenticeships**

Don't forget each sixth form has its own application process, either via its website or a specific form, so make sure to check each school's individual page in this prospectus.

We encourage you to follow the post 16 timetable **see pages 5 and 6**; apply in advance, attend open days so that you can tour the sixth forms or colleges and meet the teachers.

Whatever you choose to do, the most important thing is to spend some time discussing with your school's careers adviser, teachers and family or carers, to decide what will be right for you. This is your chance to express your skills, interests and passions!

September 2024

- Book and attend enrolment at your chosen sixth form or college if you have decided to study elsewhere. If you missed enrolment, (this is where they check your ID and documents), contact the sixth form or college as soon as possible.
- Apply to the 16 to 19 Bursary Fund if you are eligible
- Do let us know if you intend to be home educated
- Do let us know if you have barriers to education, employment or training and need further guidance
- Complete the **Post 16 activity survey** with your new education, employment or training destination, or if you need guidance

Post 16 Service

Most young people in Southwark move on to education in a sixth form or further education college each year in the September after they turn 16, or they may start an apprenticeship or other employment with training. All school leavers must stay in some type of education or training until they are 18 or to the end of their academic year 13 if they are studying full time. To enable them to achieve a full level 3 qualification by the time they are 19.

In England you can leave school on the last Friday in June if you'll be 16 by the end of the summer holidays. You must then do one of the following until you're 18:

- stay in full-time education, for example at a college
- start an apprenticeship or traineeship
- spend 20 hours or more a week working or volunteering, while in part-time education or training.

We know that some 16 and 17 year old young people may find themselves out of education and we are here to help. The Post 16 service in Southwark Council works with young people not in education to make sure that they are offered advice and guidance to support them back into education. We work closely with colleges and training providers to find the right support for each young person to help them move forward with their career goals.



This can include exploring routes into courses, apprenticeships and traineeships based on each individual's starting point.

Please use our **Post 16 Survey** form to let us know what you are up to. If you tell us that you are not in education or training we will get in touch and signpost you or advise you on your options. Information on Raising the Participation Age (RPA)

What is 'Raising the Participation Age' [RPA]?

All young people have a duty by the Education Skills Act (2008) to participate in education until their 18th birthday. Supported by parents/ carers, and schools, the Government expects each young person to make an informed decision about how they wish to participate.

Why was it introduced?

By staying in learning and training you can gain the qualifications and skills you need to help you to succeed. Advantages include:

- Making it easier to find and stay in a job
- Having the ability to earn and give you a greater choice of career paths
- Being able to compete in the future local job market; providing pathways to opportunities where you can develop your qualifications and skills further in order to support your future career aspirations for example, higher education (university) or higher apprenticeships
- You will have a greater chance to develop the knowledge and practical skills that employers are looking for.

Does this mean staying at school until I am 18?

Once you complete your GCSEs and secondary education, there are a number of options available for you to choose from:

- Continue in full time education or college
- Start a work based learning programme such as an apprenticeship, internship or a traineeship.
- Start full time work alongside part time learning which leads to an accredited qualification
- Volunteering for a minimum of 20 hours a week alongside part time learning which leads to an accredited qualification

What duty does Southwark Council have?

- Promote the effective participation in education and training of 16 and 17 year olds in our area with a view to ensuring that those persons fulfil the duty to participate in education or training
- Make arrangements to track the activity of 16 and 17 year olds, and identify those who are not participating in education or training or who have left provision, to enable us to offer support as soon as possible through the Post 16 Service
- Identify 18 year olds in-year 13 who need support to stay in education or find work, and recognise those who are receiving support from their Jobcentre Plus.





Choosing the right pathway for you

How to choose?

While you are in year 11 at school or being home educated, you may already have an idea about your future academic and career journey, such as applying for sixth form then higher education or a particular career. Some careers and university courses require you to have specific subject grades in accredited qualifications. They will ask to see your certificates as part of the entry requirements. When received keep your qualification certificates safe.

If you are unsure what you want to do in year 12 or 13, it is usually best to go with subjects you are likely to do well at and enjoy. You will still need to check course entry requirements, and find out what career path you can take with these subjects.

The following checklist may be very useful. This would enable you to create your career pathway plan. Learning how to make an informed choice, by asking:

- How does the chosen course develop your interests, skills-set and subject knowledge?
- Does the chosen course require course work and exams, what will the workload look like? What do I need to keep me motivated to keep learning?
- What are the progression routes, would the chosen course enable you to achieve your career goal?

- How much study time would you need in order to achieve a good result?
- What are the barriers to your learning that need to removed, to keep you focused, and realise your own potential?
- What are your options? **The National Career Service** are available to guide you in the right direction.

Do speak to your careers adviser at school and ask the questions as soon as you can.

Southwark's Local Offer shows what's available in the borough for children, young people and adults (aged 0-25) who have Special Educational Needs and Disabilities. It includes up-to-date information on opportunities and services that are available to you. **See page 16**

This would help you to make an informed decision to continue in education anything from an entry level to a level 3 programme, A levels, BTEC, a T level qualification, or a level 2 intermediate apprenticeship. Remember to have a backup plan if you don't meet the entry requirements for your first choice, so you continue learning.

Advice about courses

If you are likely to leave school at the end of year 11 with no or few GCSEs, or other level 2 passes, you should still follow the check list.

If you have recently moved into the borough and find yourself out of education mid-year in year 12 or 13 you may explore a back on track college course or a traineeships.

While the labour market stabilises it is advisable to stay in full time education.

Short courses are designed to add to your attainment level, qualifications and skills-set and help you to get work ready.

Often, short courses are recommended at the end of the academic year, this is because there are limited progression routes into paid employment or an apprenticeship if you are under 18.

Academic qualifications - A levels

Students now sit all A level exams at the end of two years of study, instead of taking modular exams throughout the course.

AS level results no longer count towards A level grades. No subject will have more than a 20% coursework component and most courses will be assessed entirely through exams.

Applied general qualifications BTECs level 1 to 3 or National Vocational Qualifications (NVQs)

These offer broad preparation for and introduction to a vocational area such as health and social care, travel and tourism, engineering, and performing arts. They combine academic study with practical learning.

Apprenticeships

Apprenticeships are a route for students who want to gain qualifications, progress in a chosen career and earn a salary. Apprenticeships combine paid work, with education. You must complete your portfolio and evidence you are learning this usually takes place at a college.

Apprenticeships are one to five years in length depending on the qualification level. Sometimes apprenticeships lead to a full time job. You will gain a nationally recognised qualification.

You would need to meet the eligibility criteria. Good references from your school to evidence you have job readiness skills such as good attendance and time management, able to follow instructions and work in a team. This also includes a document check for example your national insurance number, a valid passport or valid photo identification, and proof of address.

T Levels qualifications

From academic year 2023/24 more colleges and sixths forms plan to offer technical qualifications to prepare you for a specific career route such as agriculture and animal care, business administration, construction, digital, education and child care, engineering, health and science, or hospitality.

Tech Levels are 2 year Level 3 qualifications -3 months' work experience with the opportunity to grow your knowledge and skills. Equivalent to A levels; that lead to a specific occupation. You can progress on to apprenticeships, jobs and some universities after completion of Tech Levels.

Who will delivering T Levels from 2023/24.

Traineeships

A traineeship is unpaid work experience with training. These are designed to help young people aged 16 to 24 years old. Though they are best explored when you have good GCSE grades and are out of education at the end of year 13 to gain the appropriate skills and experience needed to secure an apprenticeship or a full time job in-year 14.

Traineeships can last from six weeks up to six months. They may include English and Maths, and travel to different work sites. You would need to meet the eligibility criteria. Get your parent or guardian to help you check with the training provider, if this is right for you and ask about progression routes.



Apprenticeships

Apprenticeships give you the opportunity to work, learn and earn all at the same time.

You will work for a real employer alongside other experienced staff. You will be earning a salary, gaining valuable work experience and employability skills, and you will gain a qualification.

Types of apprenticeship

You can apply for different types of apprenticeships based on your current skills and qualifications:

- Intermediate level (level 2)
- Advanced level (level 3)
- Higher (level 4, 5 and 6)
- Degree (level 5, 6 and 7)

When can I start an apprenticeship?

If you live in England and are aged 16 or over, you can apply to be an apprentice. You can start an apprenticeship on the first day after the last Friday in June (official school leaving date in England) as long as you are 16 or become 16 before 1 September of that year. You will need to be living in England and not in fulltime education.

Entry requirements

Entry requirements are based on the level of the apprenticeship. Intermediate Level 2 apprenticeships will usually require 3 to 5 GCSEs grade 4 or above including English and Maths. Or the willingness to work towards level 2 English and Maths functional skills qualifications during the apprenticeship, and meet the desired skills and qualities as advertised.

Advanced level apprenticeships usually require five good GCSE grades 4 or above. Higher level apprenticeships require good GCSE grades 4 to 9, and a level 3 qualification such as BTEC level 3 or three A levels, or a two year T Level. Or a level 2 apprenticeship qualification with a year's work experience.

Remember to check if you meet the eligibility criteria. This may include asking if you can to work and train in the UK post 16. For example you would need a national insurance number, a bank account, a leave to remain status, or UK settled status.

How much will I earn?

The minimum wage for apprentices aged 16 to 18 is updated yearly on the website www.gov.uk/apprenticeshipsguide/pay andconditions

Training and qualifications

During your apprenticeship you will also receive training to gain a nationally recognised qualification in your chosen area. Your employer will be working with your training provider to ensure the programme is structured to support you to gain the skills you need for the job.

How do I find and apply for an apprenticeship?


When you finish year 11, then you can start an apprenticeship.Applying is easy with the find an apprenticeship website, the online vacancy site provided by the **National Apprenticeship Service**. You need to create an account, log all of your information and set preferences before applying, usually by completing an online application form and answering a few questions set by the employer.

Case study

Simone Sewell, she/her Customer Service Officer Contact Centre



When I finished my last A Levels, I didn't know what I wanted to do after school, but knew that I needed to gain skills and work experience. A family member came across the advert for a level 3 apprenticeship with the Southwark Council call centre and suggested that I apply. ??

While I was at school I struggled with anxiety and it was a great challenge to put myself through the apprenticeship recruitment process. Southwark Council saw my potential.

My apprenticeship was supposed to be 18 months but due to Covid and lockdowns it lasted an additional 10 months. I've been trained and worked on services such as Repairs, Switchboard, Environments & Leisure, Housing Advice and even Covid support. I periodically attended college and met my peers where I was empowered to participate in discussions putting my newly learnt skills to use.

I gained a qualification in Level 3 Housing and Property Management, and secured a role as a temp at Southwark Council. This has helped me boost my confidence, knowledge, and professional communication skills to assist residents, customers, and my colleagues in the call centre. Through accustomed procedures and processes I also provide training to new staff and apprentices.

In the near future I aim to secure my creative career ambition this would be a permanent role working within the events or marketing team with Southwark Council.

There will be specific requirements for courses and jobs, some may have higher entry requirements than others.

If you do not achieve a minimum of a grade 4 at GCSE in Maths and English or level 2 Functional Skills, you will be encouraged to continue studying Maths and/or English.

Where can you study or train?

At the end of year 11 you have a number of choices of where to study. It is worth doing some research into the ones you are interested in. You can find information on the internet. Open days or taster days are available to check and see whether you think sixth form or college is right for you.

School sixth forms

Schools sixth forms primarily teach A levels but some may offer vocational courses such as BTEC's and T levels.

Some offer resits in GCSE Maths and English with a core subject: forming a BTEC, vocational, or a T level Transition Programme, if you did not get a grade 4 or above the first time round. This pathway would prepare you for A levels, an apprenticeship or employment by the time you are 18.

School sixth forms are smaller than most sixth form colleges and further education colleges.

You don't usually have to wear school uniform but smart clothing may be required and you will need to attend every day.

Sixth form colleges

Sixth form colleges are for 16 to 19 year olds. They have on average 1,200 students studying from entry level up to A-levels and BTEC nationals.

They offer a wide range of courses including applied courses.

Although there are no sixth form colleges in Southwark there are a number in neighbouring boroughs that you can apply for.

Further education colleges (FE colleges)

FE colleges offer a broad range of courses at different levels including entry level, ESOL, GCSE's A levels, BTEC's, traineeships, apprenticeships and vocational and occupational courses.

FE colleges are large organisations and they may have more than one site. There is no upper age limit. **See pages 61 to 64** for all the in London

University technical colleges (UTCs)

If you know the sector you wish to pursue a career in and want to develop specialist skills you may apply to a UTC. Technical specialisms include engineering, manufacturing, health sciences, product design, digital technologies or built environment.

Training providers

Some training programmes are designed to add to your attainment level, or gain some qualifications, and add to your skills-set to help you to get work ready.

Often, short courses are recommended at the end of the academic year. This is because there are limited progression routes into paid employment or an apprenticeship if you are under 18, or if the local labour market is stagnant.

Many colleges offer training programmes to enable you to get back on track if you find yourself out of education mid year please email the post 16 service on **post16service@southwark.gov.uk** or complete the **Post 16 activity survey**. Any full time regulated qualification would benefit you in your career, enabling you to make an informed decision to fill in your skills gaps to achieve your career plan.

If you are unsure what you would like to do remember at the end of year 12 or 13, you could still do the CSCS (Construction Skills Certification Scheme), first aid, football coaching, or work experience during your holidays.

What comes next?

Your choices after you have completed your chosen pathway at 18

University

Some professions (e.g. architecture, teaching or medicine) require a degree. Many more employers now expect their staff to have high levels of education.

Going to university gives you the chance to study a subject you are passionate about. In higher education you can develop valuable skills to give you a wider range of career opportunities. University can offer an environment rich in social and cultural experiences - a chance to become more independent, broaden your horizons and try out new interests.

For a few people, choosing a subject to study is simple – you will either be clear about your career path and need a specific degree to follow or you have always had a passion for a particular subject. However, for most there is a bewildering variety of courses, many of which involve subjects that are not taught in schools or colleges. So you need to do your research to narrow your choices down.

Higher and Degree Apprenticeships

A higher apprenticeship leads to a higher education level qualification (at level 4, 5, 6 or 7). Qualifications on offer include NVQ (National Vocational Qualification) level 4, HND (Higher National Diploma) and foundation degrees.

Degree apprenticeships offer a full bachelor's or master's degree. Apprenticeships at higher or degree level, could be up to six years.

Employment

When is the best age to start learning about employment rights?

Before young people enter the labour market they should know their rights to minimise the risk of becoming NEET (Not in Education, Employment or Training) in the future. At 18 you can leave education and get a full time job. Some young people may start employment in-year 12 and 13 part time while they are studying, or full time with training.

If you are an employee in the UK you are expected to follow the company rules and procedures, and your employer must follow and respect your employment rights.

Be prepared and know where to go to find out more about: minimum wage; work time regulations; young workers; work trials; these should be monitored by the job centre some young people over 18 when they apply independently for warehousing or café jobs online may be offered a work trial) to help you to make an informed decision before signing up to low wage apprenticeships / work trials with no pay check how this may affect your family's benefits or the household income. If you are a worker get to know your rights about pay, holiday entitlement, sick pay, maternity pay and leave, paternity pay and leave, and notice periods - ask your employer or your employment agency for a **contract of** employment; and pay / weekly working hours national insurance contributions.

Some young people will go on to work for the family business in year 12 and 13 you still have worker rights. The rules are different if you are **self employed.**

Other routes

There are other routes you can follow once you have completed further education or an apprenticeship.

See the "Which pathway is for me?" **Table on page 13** to identify your next step or to find a progression route.

You can take a gap year, look for an internship, work and take a professional qualification or a distance learning course.







Financial Support

As a 16 to 19 year old student you may be able to get help with money. There are different types of funding you may be able to claim.

16 to 19 bursary fund while you are at College

Check eligibility criteria with the sixth form or college. You can ask for a bursary form at enrolment day.

The college would ask you to provide evidence when you complete the application form. If you do not meet the requirements or provide the evidence within the requested timeframe you may not get a bursary.

There are two types of 16 to 19 bursary:

Vulnerable student bursary

You could get a bursary worth up to £1,200 depending on your circumstances.

See 16 to 19 Bursary Fund guide 2022 to 2023 academic year.

This group includes:

- People in care
- Care leavers
- People claiming income support
- Disabled young people who receive Employment Support Allowance and Disability Living Allowance

Discretionary bursary

You could get a discretionary bursary if you need financial help but don't qualify for a vulnerable student bursary. Your education or training provider decides how much you get and what it's used for.

Successful applicants of this bursary receive funds for course related expenditure if the household annual income is £28000 or below.

Students must meet the residency criteria in **ESFA funding regulations** for post16 provision.

How is your bursary is paid?

Your education or training provider will decide how you get your bursary. You might be:

- Paid in full or in instalments
- Paid through a bank account
- Given things like a travel pass, free meals or books instead of money

Your provider will set conditions that students should meet to receive a bursary for example, good behaviour and 95% attendance. Your bursary could be stopped if you break their rules. Remember to check the bursary eligibility criteria with the sixth form or college.

Benefits

The general rule on benefits is that if you are under 18 you cannot make a claim for any benefits.

Your parents/carers will still get any child benefit or other benefits they already receive as long as you are under 19 and in full time education. If you are not engaged, and not meeting the Raising the Participation Age (RPA) requirements, some benefits may cease.

If however you are living away from your parents, out of necessity, or have family to support, you may be able to make a claim.

Care to learn

You can claim Care to Learn if you are under 20, caring for your own child and doing a school and college course or training programme that receives public funding (fathers are eligible if they are the main carers). An application can be made as soon as you have a confirmed offer of a course.

Dance and Drama Awards (DADA)

These are available at a number of accredited dance and drama schools. The professional courses cover acting, dance, musical theatre and production skills. You must be 16 or over and show talent and a likelihood to succeed in the industry.

A Dance and Drama Award can help you pay for your tuition fees and towards living costs. The amount you get depends on your household income and where you live and study.
